It has been an exciting and challenging time since the Marine Management Organisation (MMO) vested on 1 April 2010 following the passing of the Marine and Coastal Access Act in 2009.

Everyone at the MMO was delighted that the new Coalition Government pledged their support for the implementation of the MCA Act, effectively confirming their support for the MMO's role as the new delivery body charged with being the national champion of sustainable development in the marine and coastal area.

Of course we cannot achieve the sustainable marine development on our own and I have been busy meeting a range of people and organisations across the country with a stake in the delivery of sustainable management to discuss how we might work together to deliver our activities in the most effective and efficient way.

The MMO will, like all public bodies, need to contribute to the achievement of savings across the public sector. MMO Join Forces to Tackle Emergencies

A marine emergency workshop has seen stakeholders across the marine environment working together.

Experts from Natural England, Cefas, JNCC, RSPB, Environment Agency, Defra and the devolved administrations attended the Marine Management Organisation workshop in May to discuss the Environmental Damage Regulation 2009 (EDR).

Working through a mock chemical pollution scenario near Lundy Island, the group agreed how all the relevant bodies would work together and ensure a swift and effective response to environmental damage.

Once the immediate danger to wildlife and human health had been resolved, longer-term measures to deal with the lasting damage were discussed. Those responsible for the damage can be required to bring the area (and wildlife) back to its original state. If that proves impossible, other remediation such as encouraging different species or relocating the wildlife elsewhere may be needed.

The workshop discussions will now help finalise MMO guidance for co-ordinating a response to marine emergencies if the EDRs apply.



£952,000 grants boost for English fishing industry



Almost £1 million in grants has been awarded to the English fishing industry from the European Fisheries Fund and Marine Management Organisation.

The largest single grant was more than £422,000 for a new fryline extension in Devon. The project, costing more than £1 million in total including private funding, will see the installation of new equipment and is expected to create at least five jobs in the area. It will also increase the amount of locally sourced fish processed.

In total, six grant applications were approved by the English EFF panel, chaired by the Marine Management Organisation, which met on May 19. Total grant aid, match funding and other investment in the six projects represents an estimated £2.24 million investment for the English fishing industry.

Other significant grants: a Tilapia farm in Lincolnshire has received more than £165,000, almost £172,000 was agreed for box washing equipment in Grimsby and more than £50,000 has been awarded for storage lofts in Mevagissy Harbour, Cornwall.
